ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT, 1984, SECTION 14  
AS AMENDED AND THE ROAD TRAFFIC (TEMPORARY RESTRICTIONS) ACT 1991  
ARKWRIGHT ROAD, BRITON HILL ROAD & HOOK HILL, SOUTH CROYDON  
TEMPORARY RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC & PARKING

1. Croydon Council HEREBY GIVES NOTICE that to facilitate gas main replacement work by SGN, they have made an Order the effect of which would be to temporarily restrict traffic and parking in the above roads.
2. Whilst the said works are taking place the roads/sections of road will be closed and / or have waiting and loading restrictions applied “at any time” as detailed below

Hook Hill	At its junction with Briton Hill Road <b>10 July - 17 August 2025</b>	Entire length <b>10 July - 17 August 2025</b>
Briton Hill Road	Not Applicable	From its junction with Arkwright Road to its junction with Sanderstead Road <b>17 July - 17 August 2025</b>

3. Whilst the closures are in place the diversion routes for traffic will be as detailed below.
  - Southbound Traffic on Arkwright Road - diverted via The Ridge Way, Hook Hill and Briton Hill Road.
  - Eastbound Traffic on Briton Hill Road - diverted via Church Way and Arkwright Road.
  - Westbound Traffic on Briton Hill Road - diverted via Hook Hill and The Ridgeway
4. The Order will come into operation on 10 July 2025, and it is anticipated that the work will be completed on 17 August 2025. However, the Order will remain in force for 18 months to be reintroduced should further work be required.
5. These restrictions shall not apply in respect of:
  - (a) any vehicle involved in carrying out the said works.
  - (b) a vehicle being used for fire brigade, ambulance, or police purposes, or the purposes of a statutory undertaker in an emergency, such as the loss of supplies of gas, electricity or water to premises in the area, which necessitates the bringing of vehicles into a section of road to which the order applies.
  - (c) anything done with the permission of a police constable in uniform or a Civil Enforcement Officer.
