

THE HEAT IS ON

ECO HEATING SYSTEM BREAKS NEW GROUND

Croydon Council have launched a pilot scheme with Kensa Contracting to install a low-carbon ground source heat pump system for its residents that will cut the cost to residents and the environment.

The ground source heat pumps at the Croydon council-owned 10-storey block in New Addington will cut carbon emissions, help improve air quality, and save up to £300 per home per year on more households' heating bills.

HOW TO USE THE APP

You can report fly tipping through your smartphone on our DON'T MESS WITH CROYDON app. Download the app for both iphones and android smartphones by visiting www. croydon.gov.uk/environment/dontmess/dont-mess-with-croydon-app.



STEP 1: After downloading the app to your phone you will see a green icon with the **Don't Mess with Croydon** logo on your screen (see above). This is your app (application). Press the app to open it and the first page will open. (Image 1). You have 3 choices: 'Begin' 'Report and 'Settings.'

STEP 2: Press 'Settings.' This is important as you need to register your details to report an issue. Type your email into the first white space and your mobile number into the second. (Image 2) Use the sliders underneath to choose how you would like to receive messages, then click 'Validate.' Log into your email account to complete registration.

STEP 3: Once registered you can begin. On the home page press the 'Begin' button. This should detect your location on a map (Image 3), indicated by a blue circle. There is also a red pin which you can move to the location of the fly tipping. Once you have dragged the red pin to the location, press 'Next' in the black bar at the top right of your screen.



STEP 4: Now it's time to take you picture. Press the camera icon (Image 4) and you will be asked whether you want to take a picture or use a picture you have already taken. Make your choice and then press 'Next' again.

STEP 5: Now you will be asked to give a brief description of the issue you are reporting (Image 5). Here you can give any extra details you'd like to include. The Hashtags box is optional so you don't have to fill in this space. The 'Category' is required so push the dark green button and choose the most appropriate from the list supplied. This may bring up some additional questions that must be answered. When finished press 'Next'.



STEP 6: If everything has been completed correctly, your report will be ready to submit. Click 'Send'. (Image 6). If you haven't completed the form correctly your error will be highlighted and you may have to go back and correct your report. You can do this by pushing the word 'Back' at the top of the screen on the left.



Did you know that you can also report missed recycling collections and household, garden and food waste collections online by registering wth My Account at www.croydon.gov.uk/ myaccount. AVOID A HEATING FREEZE

The cold days and dark nights setting the thermostat at a low are already upon us, so it's a temperature throughout the day good idea to check your heating is working properly before the freezing months of January and February.

Boilers can stop working because of a drop in pressure. If your boiler stops working, check the pressure dial and inspect all of your radiators and pipes for leaks. You can report any issues to the repairs team online at www. croydon.gov.uk/myaccount or by calling the repairs line on 020 8726 6101.

If you an feel cold patches on your radiators they may need bleeding to release air in the system. You can easily do this yourself using a radiator key, but make sure you turn off your heating first.

Check radiators aren't obstructed escape from your home, such as by curtains or furniture and make sure rooms are kept warm by

and night. The ideal temperature is between 18 and 21 degrees.

During months when the temperature is freezing, heating issues can be caused by a frozen condensate pipe. This can be easily fixed by pouring hot water onto the pipe to thaw the ice inside. You can prevent this happening by insulating the outside pipe (see video, p5).

Fill in gaps around windows, doors, letterboxes, floorboards and cat flaps to stop drafts. Spending a few pounds on a window draught excluder and insulation tape can help you save on your heating bills and is easy to fit.

Do not block up air vents as these are needed to allow gases to carbon monoxide.

'Croydon Council Homes **Unveiled'** (continued from cover)

Named after local First World War soldier Flora Sandes, the development in Chipstead Avenue was unveiled on 16 December 2019.

These are the first completed council homes built for Croydon residents by local developer Brick By Brick. Each of the three new council homes has its own private balcony or garden, sustainable heating, and is a short walk from the library, local shops and public

New resident Blanche Takwi, 46, had to move into temporary accommodation last year because a serious illness meant she could no longer continue her job as a qualified care support worker or stay in her old flat. Her new council home in Flora Court means she is close to the hospital and her GP as her recovery continues.

Flora Court also has 24 shared ownership homes due to complete in the New Year. Anyone buying a 25% share in one of these shared ownership flats costing £315,000 will pay £78,750 and put down a 5% deposit costing £3,688.

Why ground sourced warmth could be the future for heating in the borough

(Continued from cover story) The project comes after Croydon Council declared a climate emergency this summer, and aims to contribute towards a local target of cutting the borough's carbon emissions by 34% by 2025.

The forty-four flats are the first in Croydon to have ground source heat pumps retrofitted, replacing the existing electric storage heaters. An individual 'shoebox' ground source heat pump will be installed in each flat.

The heating distribution system is set up to prevent overheating in communal areas. Heat pumps in each flat give residents control over heating in their individuals homes and the freedom to change energy suppliers for cheaper energy tariffs.

As well as saving residents between £260 and £300 a year off their bills, the ground source heat pumps are cost less for the council to maintain than storage heaters. The replacement of the tower block's electric storage heaters with the ground source heat pump system also cuts lifetime carbon emissions by the equivalent of a 242,317-mile car journey or driving around the world ten times!

Contractors Kensa, who are installing the system, expect to complete the works by spring 2020 to coincide with an 18-month, £3.2 million refurbishment to the block including new insulation, a replacement roof and windows, landscaping and new parking.

The £700,000 heating system is funded through the council's ring-fenced housing budget and energy credits from energy regulator Ofgem.
