FULL FIBRE BROADBAND FOR OUR CROYDON RESIDENTS

Croydon's aim to become a 'smart city' and digital hub moved a step closer as it signed off on an agreement with two network providers to supply its residential blocks with access to affordable fibre broadband internet.

After months of intense planning and negotiation, the council can now begin to close the 'digital divide' for residents who have been unable to take advantage of the benefits of full fibre broadband such as high speed internet connectivity and competitively priced television packages, having now finalised arrangements with suppliers, Community Fibre and Open Reach. The council is determined that

everyone should have the same opportunity to access technology, as it plays an ever more important role in modern life.

The installation comes at no cost to the council or residents, with residents only paying if they choose to subscribe to a package. Free Wi-Fi will be provided in communal areas of sheltered housing and council owned community buildings. Also in the pipeline, as part of the project, are apprenticeships for Croydon residents and support for residents who are new to digital technology and what it can provide.

### SIMPLE STEPS TO HELP KEEP YOU SAFE

Fire can start anywhere in the home so it's sensible to have an awareness of the potential dangers that can lead to a fire and the steps you can take to prevent unnecessary risks. The London Fire Brigade issue simple advice and guidance to house holders which can help you stay safe from harm.



Early detection is vital so fit smoke alarms in your lounge/ living room, bedrooms, landings and hallways. Also fit a heat

alarm in your kitchen. It is important to ensure smoke alarms are fitted in the right place – don't fit a smoke alarm in the bathroom as steam can cause false warnings. Always follow the manufacturer's fitting instructions. Heat alarms detect the increase in temperature caused by a fire but will not be set off by cooking fumes.



Smoking is the most common cause of fatal fire in the home so the best way to reduce the risk is not to smoke! If

you're not ready to quit you can follow these suggestions:

Smoke outside and always make sure cigarettes are put out properly. Never smoke in bed or anywhere you could fall asleep. Do not leave any type of lit cigarette or pipe unattended. Use proper

> ashtrays and never throw hot ash into the

bin. Keep matches and lighters away from children.

Busy lives often mean kitchens are the hub of the home. Small lapses in concentration in the kitchen can lead to serious fire risk. Never leave pans

unattended when cooking. Don't cook if you are tired, have been drinking alcohol or taking medication that might make you drowsy.

If the pan does catch fire don't tackle the fire yourself or try to move the pan. Never throw water onto it as this can create a fireball. If you can do so safely – turn off the heat. Leave the room and close the door.Shout to warn others to get out, stay out and call 999.

> With phone chargers, games consoles and household appliances, it's important to be aware of the potential dangers

that can be caused by misusing electrical equipment. Never overload electrical sockets. If you have to use a fused in-line

adaptor or extension lead – know the limits.

Don't leave items on continuous charge. Keep electrical appliances clean and in good working order.

> Only leave essential appliances switched on, such as the fridge or freezer. Turn all other

doors in the home can help to slow the spread of smoke and fire. So when a fire broke out due to a faulty microwave the blaze spread quickly through the flat and could not be contained. Luckily the tenant and her three children were not at home when the fire took place. Sadly, the family pet dog died due to smoke inhalation.

electrical items off when they are not in use. Heating and lighting in the form of a gas/electric heater or candles make for a pleasant home environment but be aware of the risks that they present. The intense heat of a heater can start a fire so ensure you: Sit at least one metre away from heaters. Keep heaters well away from anything that can catch alight and never use them to drv clothes.

The naked flame of a candle has more obvious risk so ensure that you follow these basic guides: Candles, tea lights and incense should only be placed in stable,

heat resistant holders.

Keep them away from materials that may catch fire such as curtains, furniture, papers and clothes. Keep matches and lighters away from children.



A safe bedtime ritual will help ensure you sleep free of worry: Close all doors as this helps to

prevent fire and smoke spreading. Switch off and unplug electrical items such as TVs. Avoid charging devices like mobile phones when you sleep. Make sure candles are out before you go to bed. Check your cooker and heaters are turned off.

as low as possible where the air will

be clearer. If your escape is blocked

by fire it may be safer to stay put

### IS YOUR DRYER DANGEROUS?

In this Fire Safety special edition • If your tumble dryer is of Open House we want to alert you to an announcement by applicance manufacturers Whirlpool who have announced that a number of its tumble dryers have been found to be unsafe.

It is estimated by the government that 750 fires have been caused by the dryers produced by the company in the last 11 years.

Some tumble dryers sold under the Whirlpool brands of Hotpoint, Indesit, Creda, Swan and Proline made between 2004 and 2015 are being recalled.

If you are concerned that you own a dryer that fits this description you should:

- Go to the Whirlpool webpage and check the model of tumble dryer (www.whirlpool.co.uk).
- Call 0800 151 0905 to check whether the tumble dyer needs to be replaced.

#### **RESIDENT MEMORIES**

"My name is Kim Watkins. I was born 1st March 1957 in Mayday Hospital, Croydon. After living in Bermondsey we moved into my first Croydon home in 1966, a three bedroom house in Oak Bank, Fieldway, New Addington. My



sisters and I went to Castle Hill School.

When we first moved to Fieldway there weren't any shops on the estate. We used to go to an old coach converted into a shop for convenience foods as in those days the only other way of buying was from a milkman and a bread man.

As children we spent a lot of time in the back garden for entertainment. I remember we made a tent from an old blanket thrown over the washing line and bricks were used to hold it in place until Mum needed the line for washing; great fun for me and my sisters. We were always having fun on our swing and sometimes we'd make jam sandwiches and have a bottle of orange juice for a picnic.

After about six months in our new home we exchanged to another three bedroom house in Burford Way, New Addington.

When we moved to Burford Way where there was a coal man as well. I remember Mum always ran out of money on a Thursday and would ask the milk man for eggs / bacon and a loaf of bread and he would always help her to make sure we had tea that day. Dad would come home with his wages in a brown envelope and the milkman was paid back the following day...how times have changed now."
