

CHILDREN SPECIFIC HEALTH SERVICES

Medical Services

COMMUNITY MEDICAL SERVICE (COMMUNITY PAEDIATRICIANS)

We provide assessments / medical advice for children with Special Educational Needs, Looked After Children (adoption and fostering), children with safeguarding / child protection issues, immunisations advisory service and low birth weight clinics.

Eligibility: Children and young people aged 0-19 years old, registered with a Croydon GP.
Referrals for children with
Neurodevelopmental difficulties, social communications disorder, learning disability, Epilepsy, behaviour problems, congenital syndromes such as Down syndrome, growth and feeding.

CONTINUING CARE FOR

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Provides a tailor-made package of care over an extended period of time to meet the health needs of the child or young person; supports their parents or carers to manage their child/young person's care at home and/or in other settings safely.

Eligibility: Children and young people under 18 with complex health needs which arise because of disability, accident or illness (including life limiting or life threatening conditions) and whose health needs cannot be met by existing universal or specialist health services alone.

Eligibility for continuing care is assessed using the National

Framework for Children and Young People's Continuing Care (Department of Health, March 2010).

Hospice care

Children's hospices provide respite and terminal care for children suffering from life-limiting conditions in a home-from-home environment. Care is provided for the child and their family at no cost to them for as long as is necessary. Post bereavement support is also available.

Eligibility: Children with life-limiting conditions

CHASE

The local children's hospice service who work with children and teenagers up to the age of 19 with life-limiting conditions. There is in-patient care at Christopher's Children's Hospice as well as home care and practical and emotional support. Services are available 365 days a year, and families receive support free of charge.

RAINBOW TRUST

Provides emotional and practical support to families whose son or daughter is affected by a life threatening or terminal illness.

Eligibility: Any family can receive support from the point of their child / young person's diagnosis, (including antenatal and neonatal periods when diagnosis has been made) and support with young people during transition towards adult services up to the age of 18. Family support is available to all families whose son or daughter is affected by a life threatening illness. This includes parents, carers, the unwell child, brothers, sisters, grandparents and help with extended family members to support each other.

Referral: A referral needs to be made to the Family Support Team manager. Anyone can refer (family

member, friend, health/education / social care professional) provided consent from the family has been given for the referral to be made.

Family Support Teams only operate a temporary waiting list for referrals when absolutely necessary, and any referral made in relation to crisis or end of life care will be accepted.

Support is available from Monday - Friday between 8am* - 6pm*. There is also a 24-hr service for families in crisis, which includes a 24-hour dedicated on call number, and the possibility of extended hours of family support during weekdays and weekends.

*Some flexibility is at times exercised at the Family Support Workers discretion, on a day to day basis, depending on family circumstance.

We will support families for as long as is needed, from diagnosis to cure, or throughout times of bereavement and post bereavement support for the whole family.

Mental Health

CROYDON CHILD AND ADOLESCENT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE (CAMHS)

Provides assessment, treatment,

advice and consultation for children and adolescents with persistent and severe mental health problems and their families.

Referrals: Referrals are accepted for children and young people (up the age of 18) and their families. Referrals are made with the referees' knowledge and agreement. They typically exhibit persistent and significant disturbance of functioning where there is a likelihood of one of the following:

- Psychotic illness
- Affective disorder
- Anxiety disorder or phobia
- Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD)
- Developmental disorders (Childhood Autism; Aspergers Syndrome)
- Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)
- Post-traumatic Stress Disorder or traumas related to child protection issues
- Severe behavioural disturbance with underlying treatable condition
- Eating disorders
- Deliberate self harm

We also accept referrals where it is thought that family functioning severely impairs the social and emotional development of the child.

Who can refer?

Any professional or agency that has carried out an assessment and can position to provide sufficient information to meet the criteria regarding the child and the family. They may be GPs, paediatricians, Social Services, educational psychologists, head teachers, health visitors and others. Self referrals are not accepted.

Children's Occupational Therapy (OT)

The Children's Occupational
Therapy team is an integrated
Health and Social Care Occupational
Therapy service. The service
provides assessments and
interventions to assist children to
carry out activities of everyday life,
including self-care, play, leisure
activities and access to school and
nursery. The team also provides
advice, home and school
programmes, housing assessments,
home adaptations and specialist
equipment.

Eligibility

- Occupational Therapy (therapy and nursery/school input) is provided to children aged 0 – 16 with needs affecting their functional ability who have a Croydon GP and are in a Croydon school. Children attending a Croydon maintained school who do not have a Croydon GP will be seen for school based issues.
- Children registered with a Croydon GP who attend out-ofborough schools will only be seen if the OT service for that borough refuses access to the child. In these instances, clinic based provision will be offered.
- Social Care Occupational
 Therapy (home equipment, adaptations and housing) is provided to children aged 0-18 who are resident in the borough and who have a permanent substantial disability and meet eligibility criteria. Transition to the Adult Occupational Therapy service is supported where it is required and meets eligibility criteria on an ongoing basis

Exclusions

 Children who have generalised developmental delay will only be seen if their motor difficulties are

- significantly delayed in comparison to other areas of their development.
- Dynamic and specialist upper limb orthoses are not provided by the service.
- School based services are not provided in independent mainstream or special schools.

Children's Speech and Language Therapy (SALT)

The children's Speech and Language Therapy Service delivers universal, targeted and specialist provision. The Service maximises the speech, language and communication skills of children and young people with speech, language and communication needs in Croydon who meet the service's eligibility criteria.

Eligibility

- Children and young people aged from birth to their nineteenth birthday who are resident in Croydon or registered with a Croydon GP.
- Children who attend Croydon schools but are not registered with a Croydon GP and who do not live in Croydon will have free access to universal services.
- Targeted or specialist services will be available to these children either via a reciprocal arrangement with the responsible Clinical Commissioning Group or Local Authority, or as an individually funded package for which the Service will charge the relevant Clinical Commissioning

- Group or Local Authority.
- Services will also be provided to those with no fixed abode such as refugees or families in hostels.

Children's Physiotherapy Service

The Children's Physiotherapy Service provides community based physiotherapy for children with neuro developmental disorders or movement delay throughout the London Borough of Croydon.

Eligibility

- Children and young people aged 0

 16 years who have physical problems of an orthopaedic, rheumatology or respiratory nature.
- The service sees children who have a Croydon G.P.
- Those who go to a Croydon local authority school who are registered with a GP elsewhere will also be seen by the service where the school requires therapy advice to support the child's progress. A reciprocal agreement must be in place with their home CCG.

HEALTH VISITING SERVICE

Health visitors provide a community-based public health nursing service which delivers health promotion in line with the Healthy Child Programme, and targets health inequalities to improve the health outcomes for children and parents. Babies are seen with follow up as appropriate, either at home or in a clinic setting. Routine developmental reviews of children aged 1 year and 2-2.5 years are also delivered by the service.

Eligibility: All babies in Croydon registered with a Croydon GP.

SPECIAL SCHOOL NURSING

The Special School Nursing Team is team of nurses and health care assistants. The team enables the nursing needs of children to be met whilst attending special schools and enhanced learning provisions, including delivering training for other staff that will need to provide, or be aware of, a child's care needs.

Eligibility: Children and Young People aged 0- 19 who are registered with a Croydon GP and attend a Special School or Enhanced Learning Provision in Croydon, who are eligible for the service, based on their specific health needs.

Hearing and Vision

CHILDRENS HEARING SERVICE

The Children's Hearing Service (also known as the Paediatric Audiology Service) is a universal child and family friendly service. The service includes: Detection of hearing loss by providing relevant screening, surveillance and information services and Treatment of hearing loss including the provision of hearing aids together with advice and on-going management.

Eligibility: Children and young people aged 0-19 years old, registered with a Croydon GP, covering mainstream and special school.

Exclusions:

- Children who are resident out of Croydon without a Croydon GP
- Children with cochlear implant and bone anchored hearing aids
- Children over 18/19 years of age who have been transferred to the Adult Audiology Services for ongoing care

Our service provides emergency contraception for all age groups as appropriate. We provide a mix of walk in and wait clinics and appointment clinics, including evenings and Saturdays.

Eligibility

 The service is for people aged 13 years and above who are sexually active and require contraceptive information/advice and supplies.

- The service is available to children and families within and outside Croydon for general contraceptive needs.
- Only Croydon residents are offered specialist services, for example domiciliary/outreach care, psychosexual and natural family planning services.


GOING INTO HOSPITAL WITH A LEARNING DISABILITY

LOOKED AFTER CHILDREN'S SERVICES

What Happens when a young person reaches 18

If a young person has ongoing health needs their health team will support them to plan their future. Transfer to specialist adult health services is managed by the Croydon Joint Community Learning Disability Team - a team of social services and health staff who work together to support adults with a learning disability and their carers.

Eligibility: Age range – over 18. Must have a diagnosed learning disability with evidence of medical diagnosis in referrals where eligibility is not confirmed. People must be registered with a GP in Croydon.

Continuing Health Care

Some people may be referred for an NHS Continuing Health Care assessment for adults. NHS continuing healthcare is free care outside of hospital that is arranged and funded by the NHS.

Eligibility:

 You must be over 18 and have a complex medical condition and

- substantial and ongoing care needs.
- You must have a 'primary health need', which means that your main or primary need for care must relate to your health. If you have a disability, or if you've
- --- been-diagnosed with a long-termillness or condition, this doesn't necessarily mean that you'll be eligible for NHS continuing healthcare.
